## **Question 1**

- 1. Draw size is 32
- 2. Any answer that makes sense for this time of the year, Easter, Spring, etc.

- 4. \$1885.53, includes all taxes, gratuities, but not profit margin
- 5. Total cost of court time including all taxes is \$840.00
- 6. Total cost per person not including taxes, gratuities, \$57.70

- 8. Any answer but should include those that were mentioned in CC guide, ie table talkers, posters, bulletin boards, telephone, word of mouth, email, letters, etc

# **Question 2**

### Round two

### Possible formats:

- 2 1/12 hours to play 5 rotations of 25 minutes each with 5 minutes for changing When you don't have a rotations book, breaking players into smaller groups helps in organizing.
  - a) Make each group of 4 on a court a separate grouping ie, 1,2,3,4 has player 17. Group players 5,6,7,8, have 18 and so on. They play 5 rotations within their group of 5 players with each player sitting out once, therefore everyone has equal time playing. Example 2<sup>nd</sup> round would be 1 & 3 vs 2 & 17, player 4 sits outs, 5 & 7 vs 6 & 18, player 8 sits out and so on.
  - b) Same format as above but break group into players 1-8, with feed ins of 17, 18, and group players 9- 16 have feed ins of 19, 20 and form players into teams of two that remain together. Example 2<sup>nd</sup> round: Team 1 & 2 vs 5 & 6, 3 & 4 vs 17

& 18, team players 7 & 8 sit out. Second grouping 9 & 10 vs 13 & 14, 11 & 12 vs 19 & 20, with team players 15, 16 out.

c) Use form line from CC guide, shifting players along slider of 4 at a time.

# **Question 3**

- a) What will be the response?
- Refer to CC guide on ethics.
